Month & Year: January 2021

1. Standing Committee: Legislative

Tony Cardenas, the League of California Cities, gave a presentation to the Legislative Committee. He highlighted the following items:

- COVID related shutdowns have resulted in the loss of revenue for Orange County cities. This amounts to \$3 billion. This revenue loss will affect services in 2021 as well as creating employee furloughs.
- Unfunded pension obligations are also a problem.
- The county will receive no money from the failed Proposition 15.
- Affordable housing is a major issue for the county. It is possible that the State Legislature may take up this issue. The impact of the wildfires and COVID are the other two significant statewide issues.

The Committee decided to establish an ad hoc committee to look into long terms such as No Senior Goes Hungry.

The Legislative Committee will have a new Chair and Vice Chair for the years 2021 and 2022.

Because of holidays on the 3rd Mondays of January and February, the meetings will occur on the 2nd Mondays (January 11 and February 8).

The topic for the January meeting will be the California Senior Legislature by John Pointer.

2. Standing Committee: Health & Nutrition

3. Standing Committee: Housing & Transportation

SNEMT (Senior Non-Emergency Medical Transportation) Ride costs have increased due to COVID required cleaning after each trip. Ridership has been trending down also due to COVID, not able to transport as many people. Going to send out survey to customers for satisfaction information. Trips are usually for chemo, dialysis, COVID vaccinations, with no shopping or causal trips. Average cost per trip in October from \$43.91 to \$51.91. Average trip length 5.39 - 6.12 miles. Trips provided in Area 1: 2,079, Area 2: 1,850 miles, and Area 3: 3,149 miles.

PRESENTATION:

Todd Cottle, C&C Development Co., Altrudy Lane Senior Affordable Apartment plans in Yorba Linda. Todd Cottle, C&C development Company gave an excellent presentation. This will be 48 affordable senior living apartments in Yorba Linda. In 2002 property was acquired in Yorba Linda and in 2008 identified as affordable housing complex. 2012 property was rezoned for potential apartments. 2020 construction began and complex is for 62+ years old. 58 parking spaces available and it's a gated community. Apartments are 686-972 square get per unit. One- and two-bedroom apartments with many amenities, including dog park, community exercise room, BBQ's and Central Air/Heat. Conveniently located, walking distance to town center, library and shopping. WIFI available with approximate rental fees of \$1,100 per month. All appliances are provided, refrigerators, stoves, except microwave ovens are not induced. Elizabeth Busick noted and questioned lack of microwaves, and the answer was not real clear why not provided.
