



POVERTY STATUS IN PAST 12 MONTHS











Top 5 Leading Causes of Death Among Older Adults in Orange County

According to the National Institute on Aging, 80% of adults 65 and older have at least one chronic condition, while 68% have two or more.

The 10 most common chronic conditions are: hypertension, high cholesterol, arthritis, coronary heart disease, diabetes, chronic kidney disease, heart failure, depression, Alzheimer's disease and dementia, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD).






Several studies show the negative effects of loneliness and social isolation on mental health and wellbeing. Loneliness is a source of silent suffering for older adults and can lead to other major risk factors.

According to a 2020 study on social isolation and loneliness, having fewer social connections increases the risk for premature death. This is because isolation increases the risk of cognitive decline, dementia, depression, high blood pressure, and negative health factors.

In 2020, 2.9% of adults aged 60 years or older (approximately 20,000 Orange County residents) reported experiencing psychological distress in the past year. Psychological distress includes feelings of nervousness, hopelessness, restlessness, depression, demotivation, and worthlessness.

Percent of OC Adults Age 60 or Older Who Experienced Psychological Distress in 2020




Estimated Percent Increase in Dementia or Alzheimer's Disease

KEY ASSESSMENT INSTRUMENTS

Stakeholder Interviews

Key informant interviews will convey the landscape, raise issues and concerns, identify key populations of need and gaps in service. This feedback will shape questions in the community and provider surveys and identify key populations for focus group analysis.

Community & Provider Surveys

Informed by stakeholder interviews, community and provider surveys will drill down into aforementioned areas of concern from the dual perspectives of being the recipient of care and the provider of care.

Groups &
Town Halls

Focus groups will be used to supplement qualitative primary data collection by probing further and asking for specific examples and lived experience. Town halls serve a similar role but will cover a wider audience.
